Executive Summary

The University of Malakand, a newly established institution in a comparatively underdeveloped part of the country is striving hard to come up to the expectations of the nation. Since its inception in 2001-2002, it has considerably improved in its own right.

During this period, it has not only established its reputation in the area but has also attracted people from different parts of the country. The University is fully aware of the educational needs of the nation in general and the people of Malakand Division in particular. After the establishment of Campus II in the beautiful valley of Sheringal, a new campus at Swat district is to be launched soon.

Initially, the University offered admissions in 4-Year BA / BS (Hons) program in only six departments. This number has now grown to 11 with the same number of new department in the pipeline. Sensing the dearth of educational institutions at all levels, constituent schools and colleges have been disseminating knowledge at primary, secondary and higher secondary level. They are successfully operating on both the campuses. Similarly, a 2-Year Masters program has been launched to accommodate and facilitate variety of students. In addition, all the degree and postgraduate colleges of Malakand Division both in public and in private sectors have been affiliated with the University while other private sector institutions are in the waiting to be affiliated.

In order to improve the qualifications and skills of the faculty, the University of Malakand currently benefits from the various scholarship schemes initiated by the HEC. As many as 31 faculty members are benefiting from HEC- Faculty Development Program and are pursuing their PhDs abroad.

The University's Central Library is passing through developmental phase. It was established in 2003-2004 with a stock of 575 books, which have now grown to 7440.

Driven by its core value of Social Responsibility, the University assists and facilitates poor students in their studies. Financial assistance is given to students and various sources are exploited in this connection.

The Directorate of Sports and Games, University of Malakand has been equipped with relevant facilities to organize and participate in sport events. Presently, it organizes Degree Level Sports both for male and female students. It also organizes and supervises sport events on the campus and represents the University in various sports events both on provincial and national levels.

The University believes in the constructive role played by students' societies by directing their energies in healthy activities. The relevant section has been reactivated and a model has been approved, which shall be in operation soon InshAllah.

Introduction

University of Malakand (UOM), the dream- a prey to political polarization and “Inter-districts’ antagonism” since 1972; could not be materialized till 2001, when the concentrated efforts of the then Governor, N-W.F.P Lt. Gen(R) Syed Iftikhar Hussain Shah, bore fruit. Again it was he who gave the idea of establishing the university at the present site. After consultation with the PIDC high-ups, he formally announced the establishment of the university in August 2001.

After the announcement, some legal points were raised by the Provincial Law Department regarding establishing a university in the PATA (Provincially Administered Tribal Areas). The issue was resolved by the President of the Islamic Republic of Pakistan by allowing the UOM through a Presidential Order / Regulation. Hence, in a sense it is the only university in Pakistan chartered / established by the highest seat of power in the country. The Provincial government, through a Gazette Notification No P-III dated 27-10-2001 (Extraordinary) formally announced a university for Malakand Division in the premises of the defunct DFIC at Chakdara.

Since then it is expanding its range of activities and has brought into its fold not only the degree colleges of Malakand Division but has established new institutions to provide quality education to the students of all ages.

The establishment of the UOM has been an effort to revolutionize the area, benefiting the people of the province in general and those of Swat, Bunir, Shangla, Dir (Lower), Dir (Upper), Chitral, Malakand Agency and Bajawar Agency in particular.

In order to make the UOM a model institution in the country, the provincial government transferred nearly 65 Acres of land at Sheringal to the university, which includes rest houses, bungalows and halls etc. The campus is situated among the sky-kissing mountains in the beautiful valley of Sheringal on the bank of river Panjkora. It has a plain and vast area with orchards of apples, apricots and other seasonal fruit.

The area is a triangle connecting Kalam Kohistan of Swat district with Chitral and Dir district.

The University took a humble start with scant resources. In the first session, after its inauguration, a total of six departments were launched enrolling 173 students. In addition, about 16 faculty members were made available to serve in the University.

The UOM currently offers admissions in eleven teaching departments on Open Merit basis. The courses offered are 4-Year BA/BS (Hons) in Biotechnology, Botany, Computer Science, Economics, English, Forestry, Information Technology, Management Studies, Mathematics, Pharmacy, and Sociology. However, Graduate and Postgraduate programs are being launched in the current session.

All the teaching departments in the university have eclectically designed their respective curricula. However, guidelines of the HEC in this regard have been followed to bring the curricula at par with national and international standards.

Sheringal High Altitude Research Center (SHARC) has been established on Campus II on a piece of land, which is a natural bounty in terms of Flora and Fauna. It operates in the field of Medicinal plants and Biotechnology to preserve, propagate and utilize various precious and extinguishing plants species. Separate labs have been established including Phyto-Chemistry, Tissue Culture, Herbarium, Cold Room and Green House. It is worth mentioning that the collaboration of HEJ Laboratory Karachi, Hamdard Labs, Karachi and Qurshi Industries Lahore has been there ever since. Besides, fruit orchards are developed and experiments are conducted to improve the quality and quantity of fruits, vegetables and cereals. Moreover, wild timber is also being observed here. Workshops are being conducted to discuss biodiversity, medicinal plants on high altitude and to find market avenues for these valued plants.

In 2005, the university administration decided to launch the department of Forestry at Sheringal campus II. Presently, it offers admissions in 4-Year BS (Hons) program. It is the only department of its nature situated in a complete forest environment in the country.

In order to enrich the faculty and to create an atmosphere of research, the UOM has hired scholars from Egypt, Russia, and Philippines. Three of them have already joined the university. In an effort to facilitate them, a Foreign Faculty Hostel is in the final stages of its completion.

University of Malakand has its own library stocked with latest editions of leading and quality textbooks, reference books, national and international journals. In order to provide access to the scientific journals and e-libraries, the UOM, in collaboration with the HEC has launched a program entitled "Digital Library Program". It has enabled the faculty and students to have free access to

academic journals, scholarly publications and to utilize e-resources for knowledge gathering.

Dr. Atta Ur Rahman IT and Communication Center has been established to equip the students and faculty to face the challenges of modern world in the field of IT. It provides space for 30 computers. It also provides campus wide PABX facility.

The university has got 03 labs for Biotechnology, 03 for Pharmacy and 04 for Computer Sciences besides one Conference Room and a Digital Lab. The project of Computerization and Networking at the UOM aims at facilitating the students and faculty to have access to the world of Internet.

The University has Green House, Animal House and Fishpond. They fulfill the needs of science students. The fishpond is large enough that in future it can be used for large-scale production of fish for commercial purposes. Besides, they present an attractive site for visitors and add to the beauty of the campus.

The UOM has approved design for botanical garden, which will be utilized for maintaining the living plants' collection of different varieties and species including the ornamental, cultivated, wild and medicinal ones. It shall also serve as a center for documentation, research, reference, data storage education, conservation and several biological facilities.

For healthy mind and soul, Sports activities have always been indispensable part of life. The spirit of competition inculcated in the playground has its emblems in the academic activities. So far the UOM has developed playgrounds for Badminton, Basketball, Cricket, Football, Hockey and Volley Ball. The establishment of Sports Complex for both indoor and outdoor games is in the pipeline.

The University has a full-fledged Directorate of Sports and Games, established in 2003. It takes steps to organize and monitor both indoor and outdoor games. It organizes Intra-University Tournament, Degree-Level Sports and represents the UOM in Inter-University Games, Provincial Sports Gala and other such sports events. Besides, the students' societies aim at enabling the students to invest their energies in constructive activities.

The UOM is exceptionally fortunate to have engendered an opportunity to open constituent schools and colleges on both the campuses. In this regard, the response of the people of the respective areas has been prompt and positive. There is University Public School in the vicinity of the main campus while the

adjacent University Girls College offers admissions in FA / FSc. Similarly, the UOM has also established University Public School and University Boys College at Sheringal campus II.

Currently the degree and postgraduate in the territorial jurisdiction of the UOM are affiliated with it. They offer admissions in BA / BSc / BBA / B.COM / MA / MSc / MED / MCOM. They were initially affiliated with the University of Peshawar.

The students from far-flung areas need to have well-furnished lodgings. The university has ensured that each student resides in a highly adjustable environment where he can properly invest his time in his studies and other hygienic activities. Initially, the former PIDC residential flats have been made into Boys' Hostels accommodating about 300 students. Besides, there is a separate Youth Hostel on the main campus, which is utilized for guest students visiting the UOM from across the country. While girls have been accommodated in seven bungalows in the Professors' Colony declaring each as a Girls' Hostel. However, new hostels are in the final stages of completion to meet the increasing demand for accommodation.

The already existing Officers' Colony of the PIDC has been renovated as Professors' Colony while a well-furnished Staff Hostel meets the needs of the faculty members.

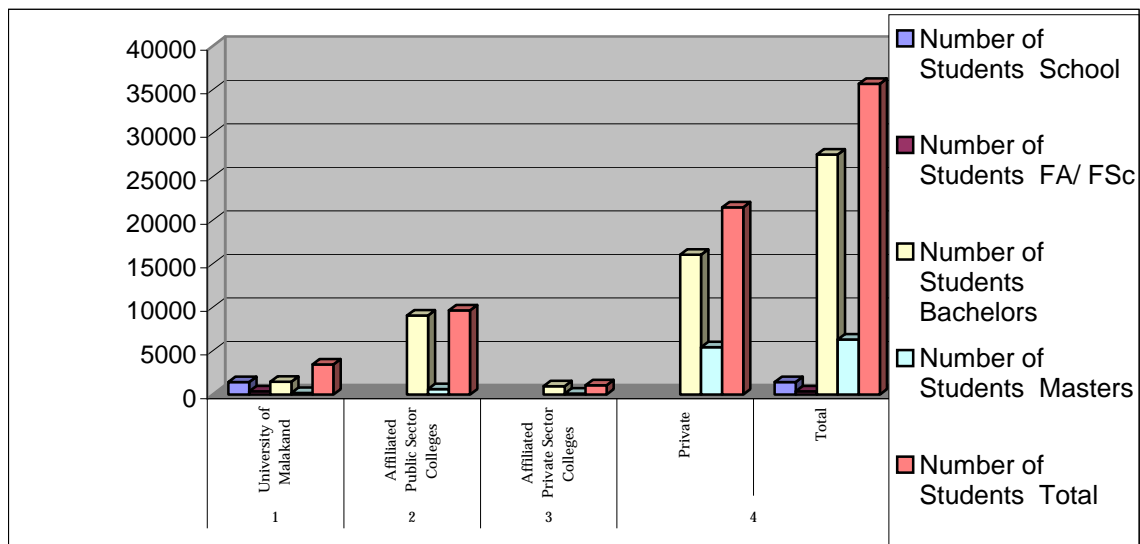

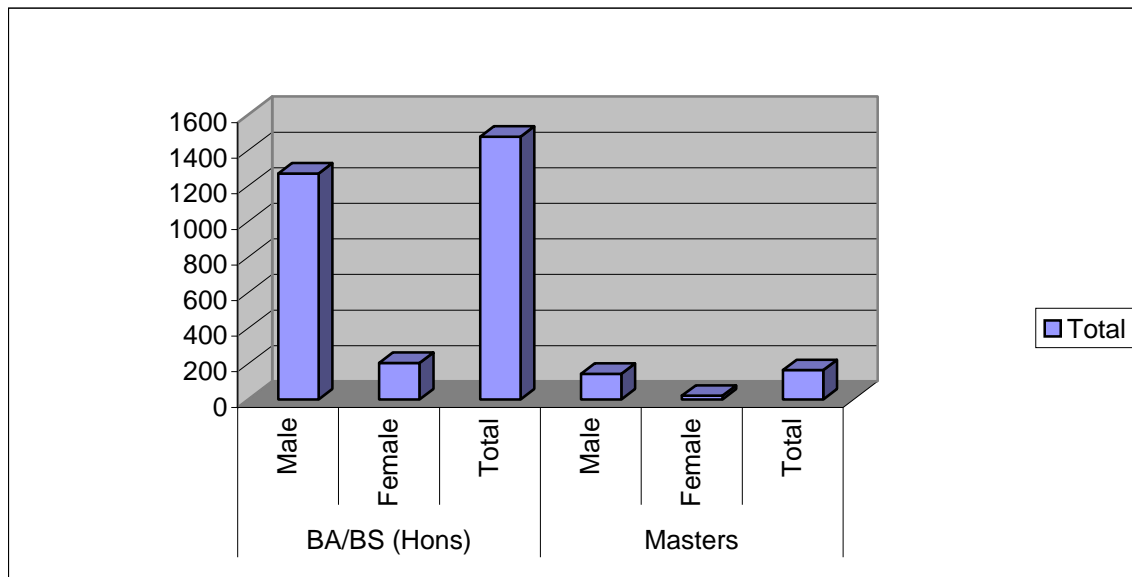
Table 1: Overall Enrollment

Table 2: Existing Campus Enrollment

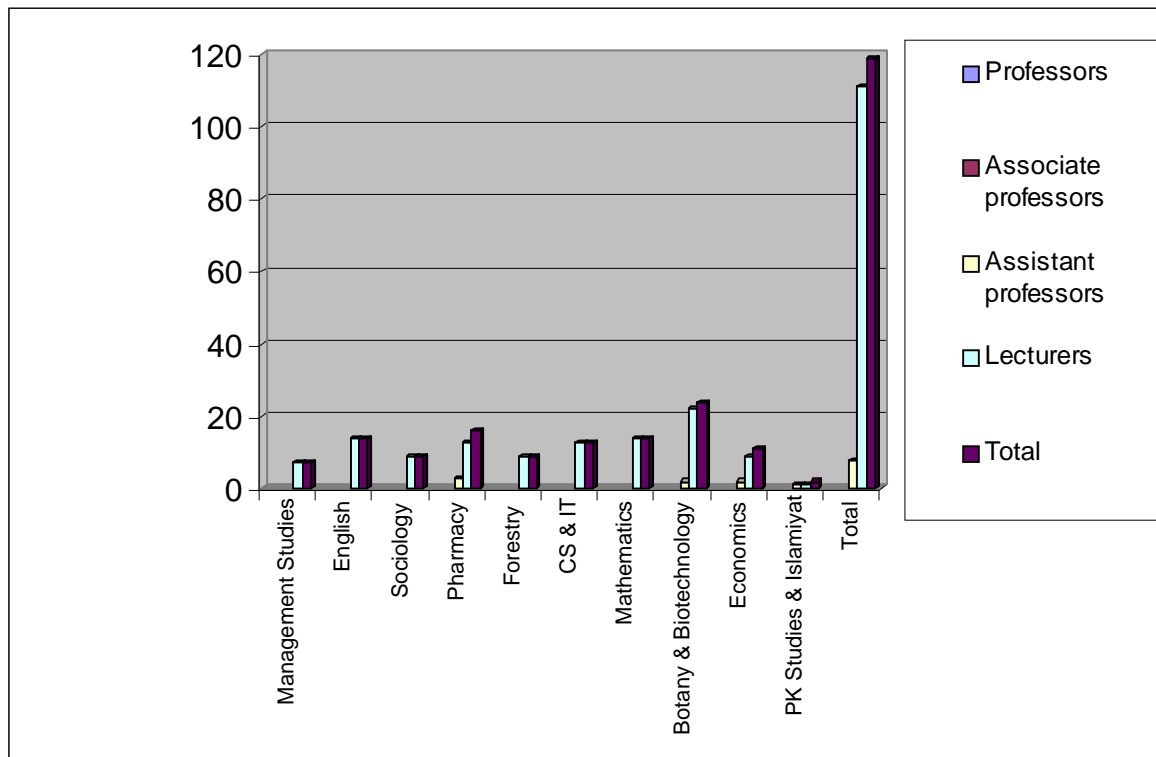

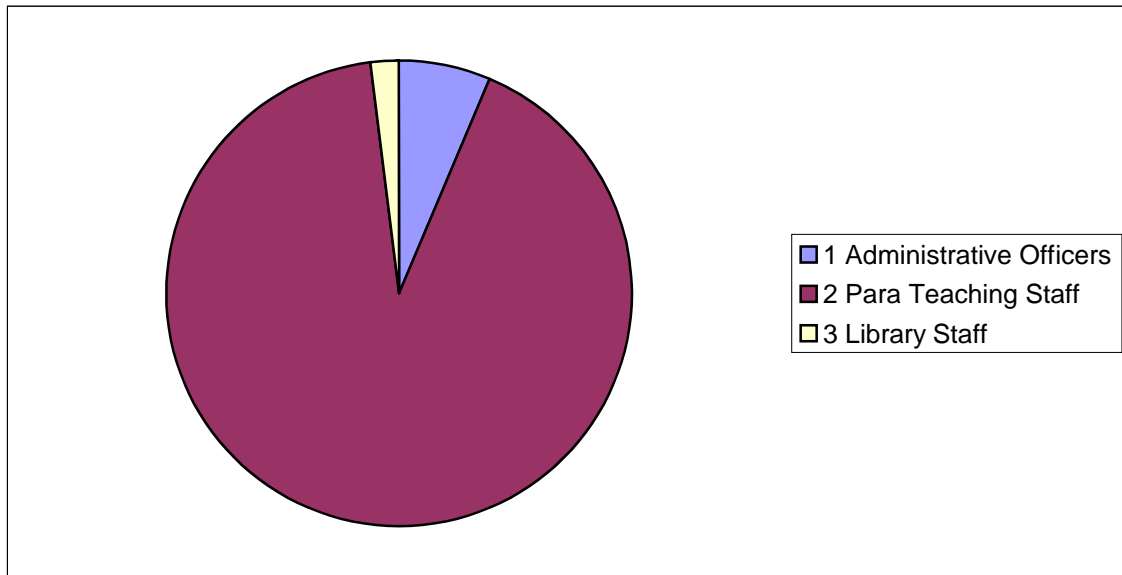
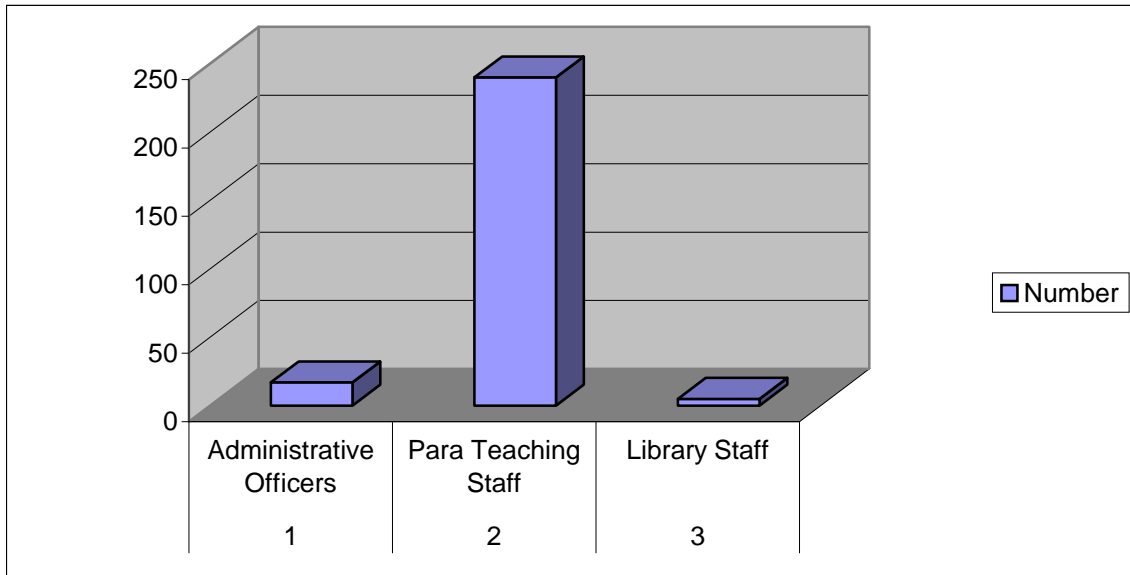
Table 4: Teaching Staff on Leave for PhD

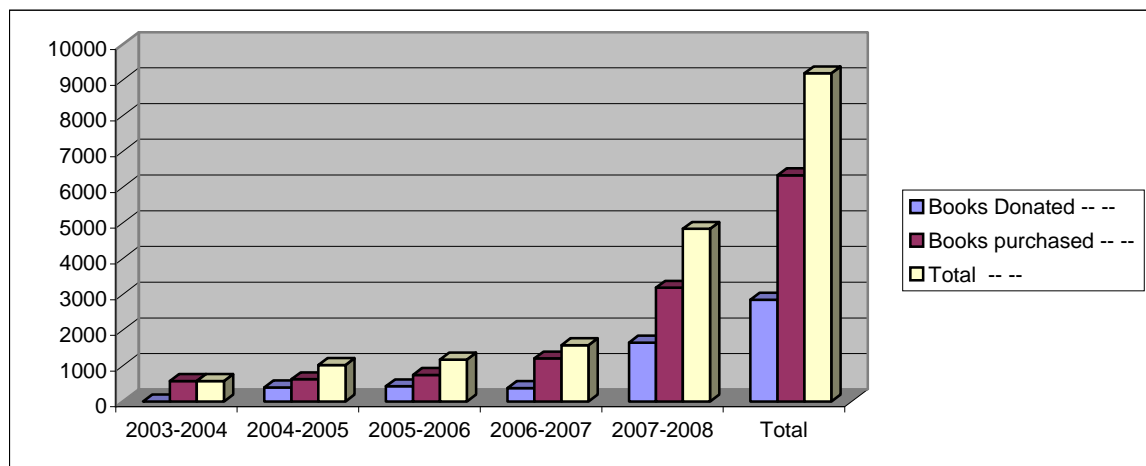

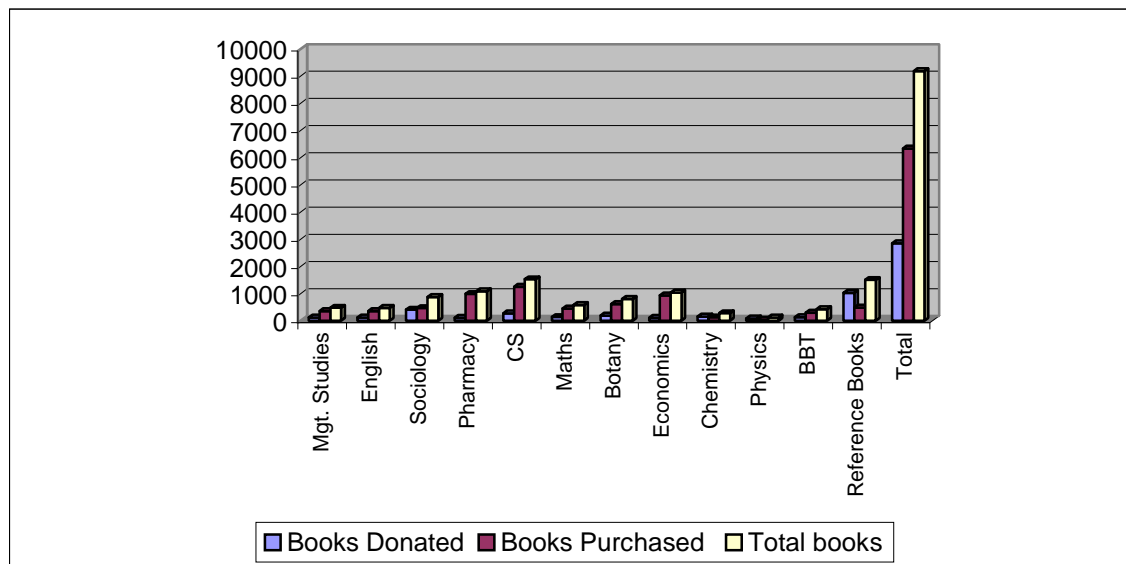
Table 7: Central Library: Strengthening Process

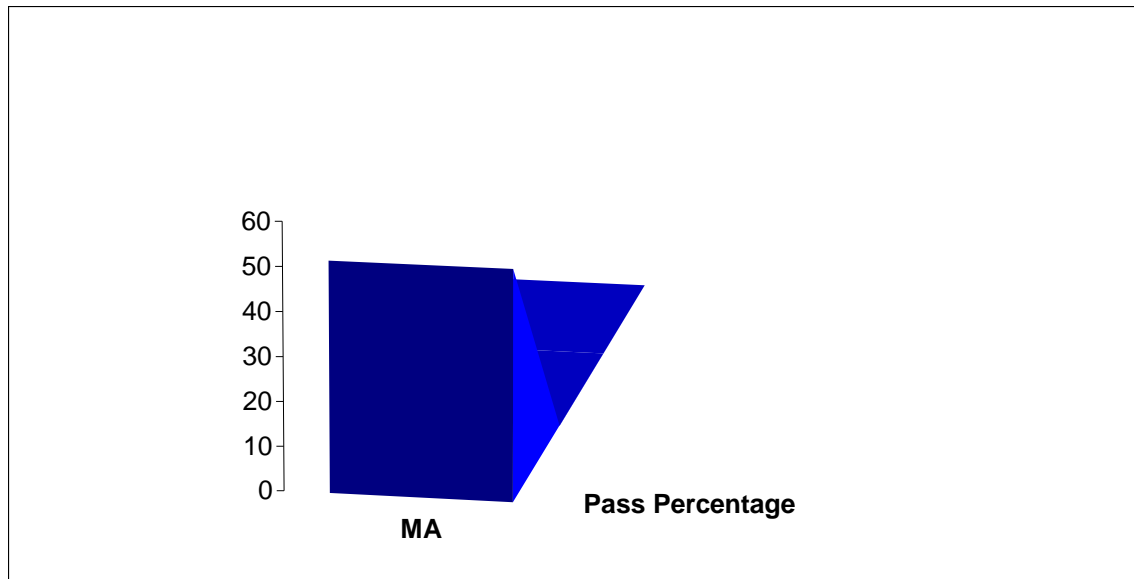
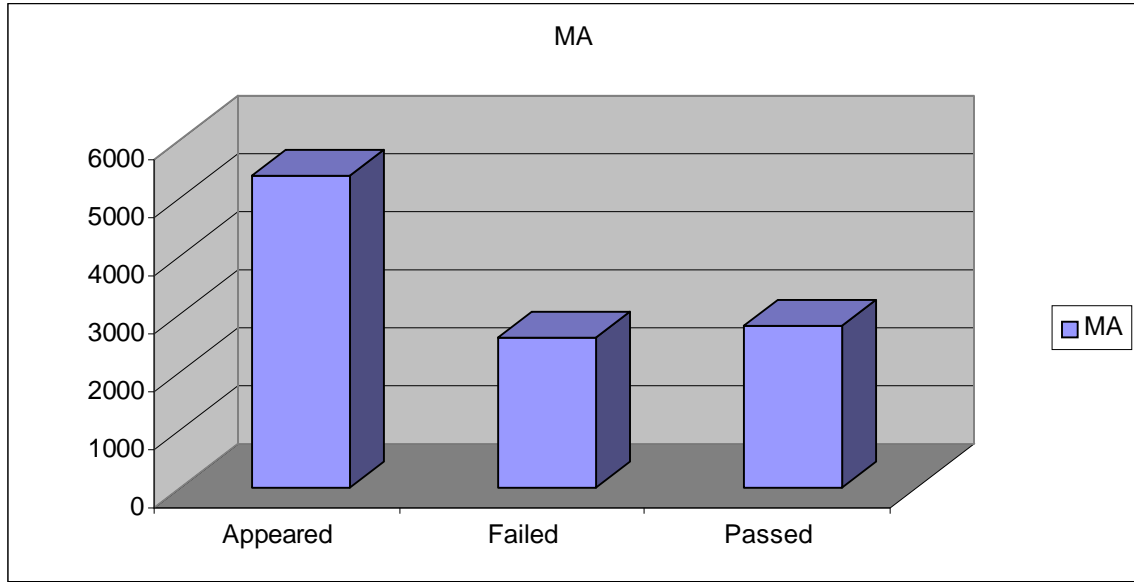
Table 10: MA / MSc Examination Results-Regular Students

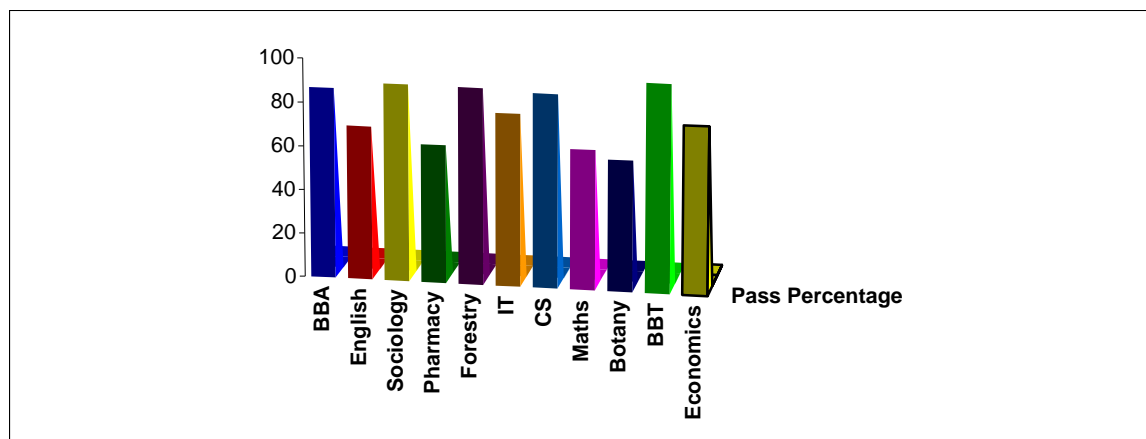
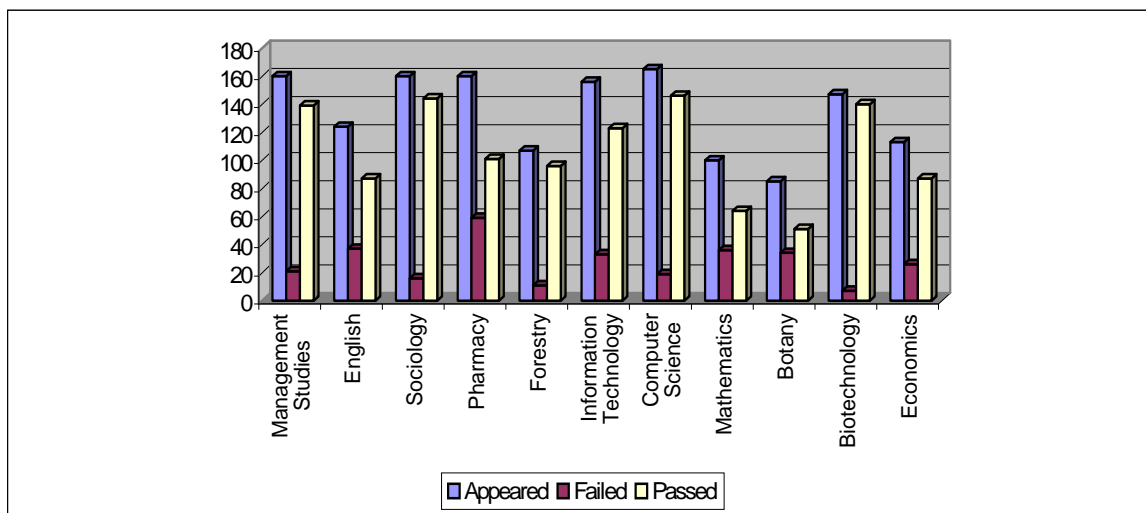
Table 13: 4- Year BA/BS (Hons) Examination Results – Total

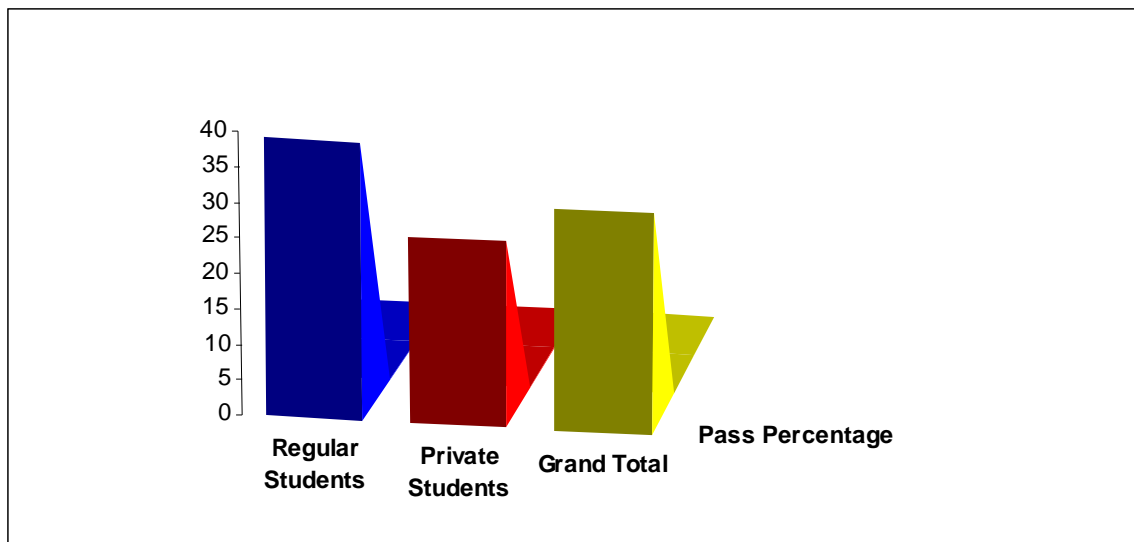
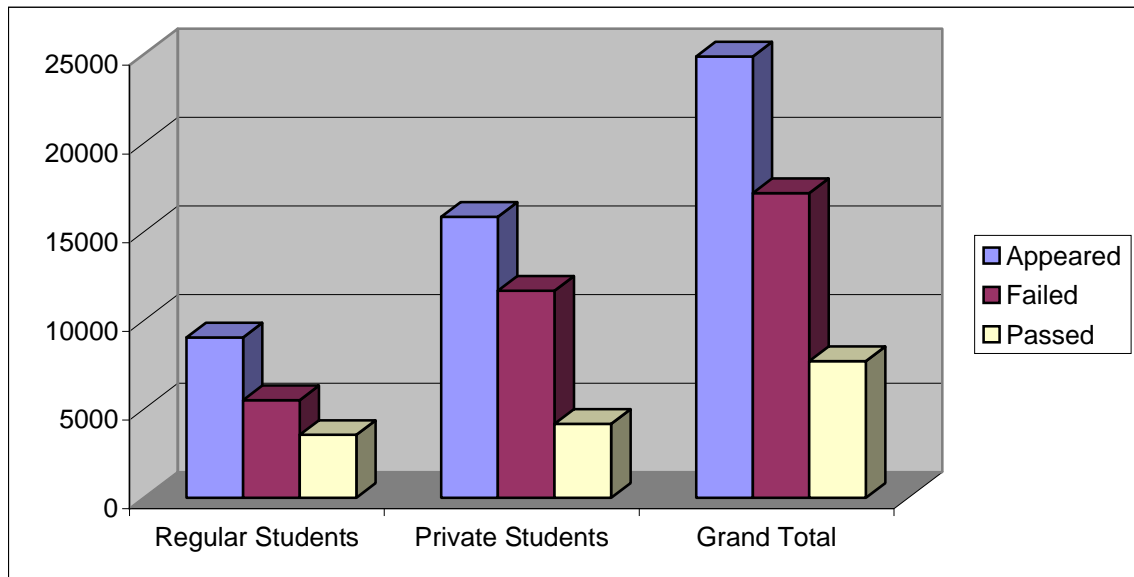
Table 14: 4- Year BA/BS (Hons) Examination Results – Department-Wise

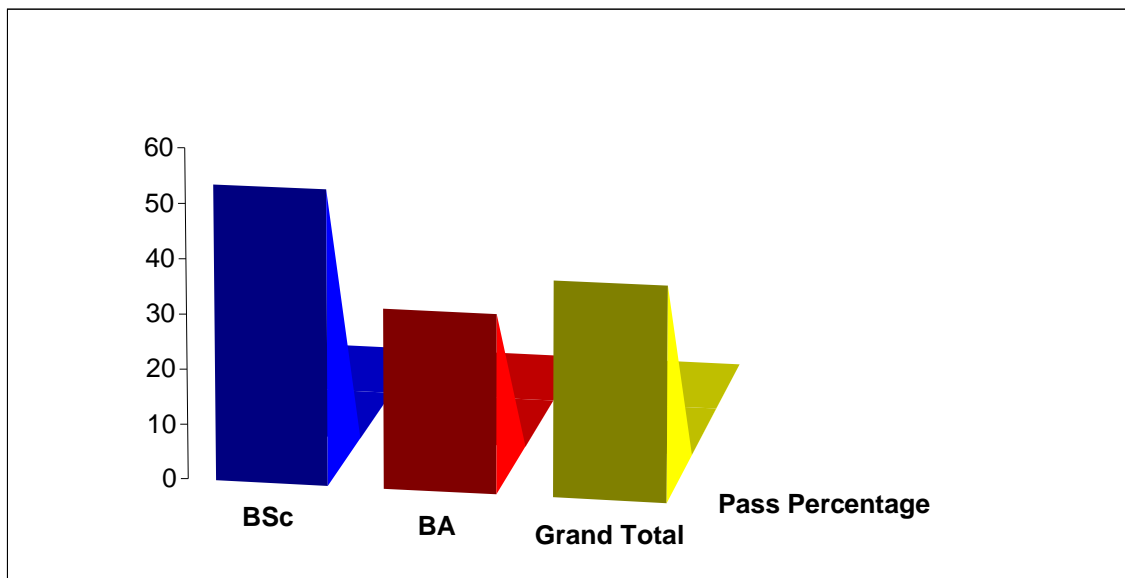
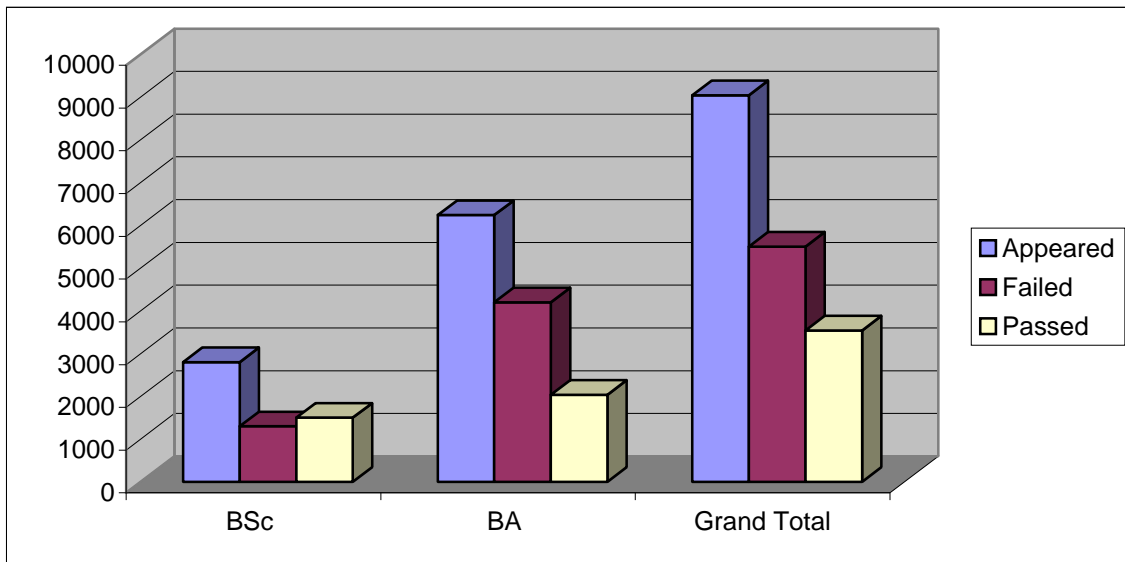
Table 15: BA / BSc Examination Results – Total

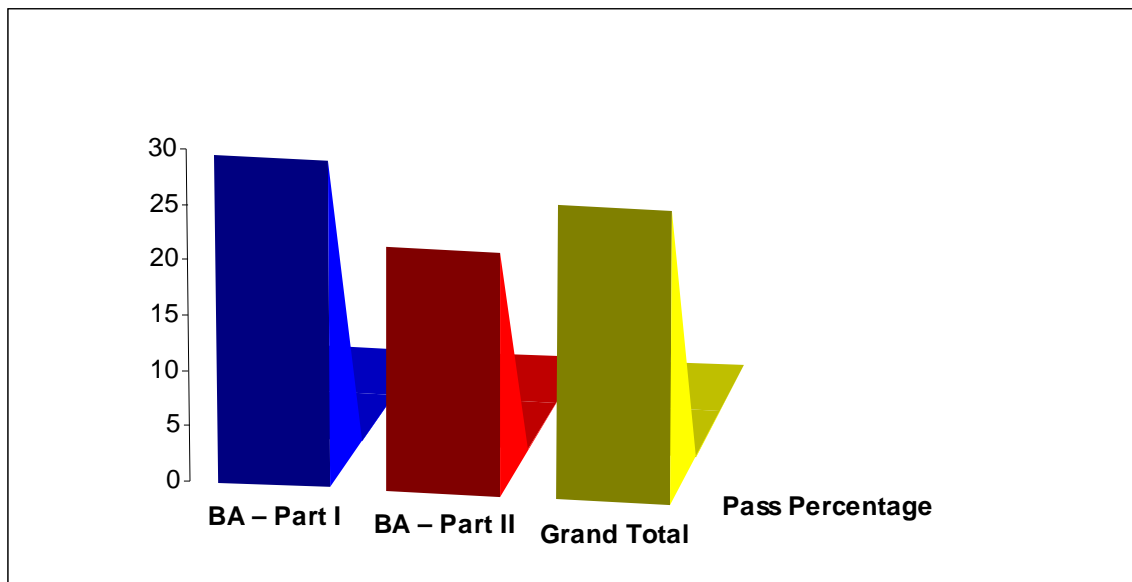
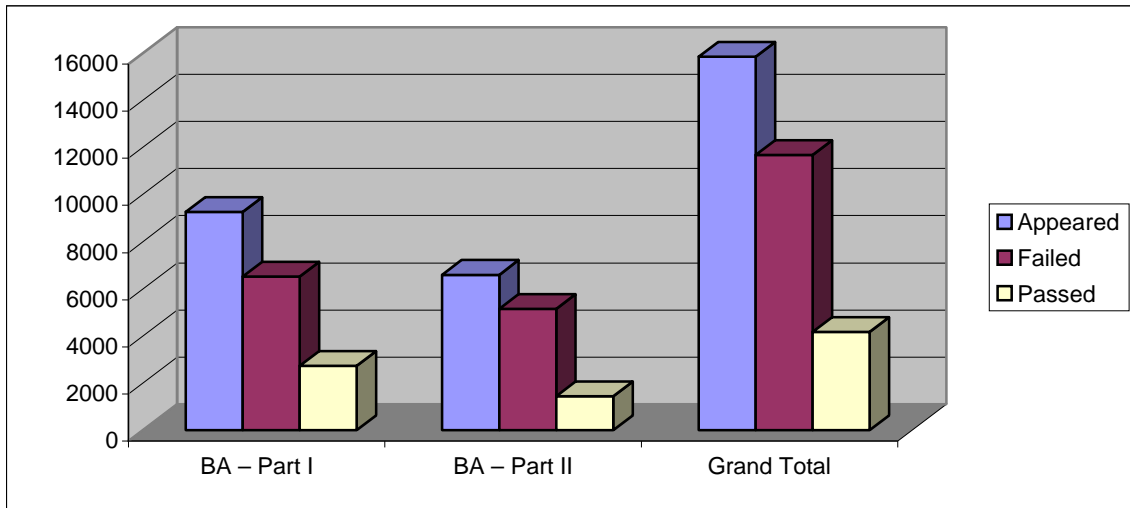
Table 16: BA / BSc Examination Results – Regular Students

Mega Events on the Campus in 2007 – 2008

Seminar on Hepatitis

In order to increase awareness about Hepatitis, a seminar was organized by the department of Pharmacy in collaboration with Rehman Paramedical Institute, Batkhela on Nov 13, 2007. Students and faculty members attended it. The Vice Chancellor was the chief guest at the occasion while Dr. Rauf represented the Afnan Abdullah Awareness Society (AAAS).

The speakers highlighted the potential threat in the form of hepatitis and warned the participants about the urgent need of taking precautionary measures to avert the disease. It was termed to be no less than a Time bomb. A concern was shown over the increasing number of people falling prey to the disease particularly in N-W.F.P. The speakers also pointed to the various steps that need to be taken to combat the disease. On the same day, arrangements had been made for Blood Screening Laboratory with the assistance of Rehman Paramedical Institute to check blood samples for Hepatitis thread.

Commencement of Classes in Masters Program

With the aim to fulfill its commitment to disseminate knowledge at all levels, the University of Malakand decided to embark upon yet another ambitious program of launching Two-Year Masters program in the evening. This step was taken mainly to facilitate the working and professional classes of the society. Classes have commenced from February 10, 2008 in the said program.

Annual Day at the UPS Campus I

The Annual Day function was organized in the UPS Campus I at Chakdara on March 20, 2008. During the colorful ceremony, students participated in different activities and displayed their skills in public speaking, drama, one-man shows and national songs.

Youth and Culture of Peace workshop

A two-day workshop (25-26 April, 2008) was organized by the department of Sociology in association with DOWSTY (Developmental Organization for Women Development) with the assistance of Youth and Culture Wing of CSC (Christian Study Center) Rawalpindi, which was represented by Mr. Tauqeer Chughtai at the occasion.

The speakers expressed their views on Peace Education and argued about education as a road to harmony. They also highlighted the role of religion in bringing peace. Besides, the role of youth was established and the problems they were faced with in their journey towards the culture of peace were discussed. The representative of CSC gave his comments over the workshop. He appreciated the organizers and the contribution made by the speakers and the students to make the workshop a success. On behalf of the CSC, he assured the organizers of full support in organizing such workshops in future. In the end, certificates and gifts were distributed among the speakers and the organizers.

Governor N-W.F.P / Chancellor Visit to the University

His Excellency Governor N-W.F.P Engineer Owais Ahmad Ghani paid a visit to the University. On April 21, 2008, he visited Sheringal Campus II and laid the foundation stone of boys' hostel Block I, a project worth Rs. 34.206 million.

Accompanied by the Vice Chancellor and the faculty members, the Chancellor visited the various sections including the department of Forestry, High Altitude Research Center, botanical labs and Green House.

Later on, his Excellency governor N-W.F.P / Chancellor of the University of Malakand Engineer Owais Ahmed Ghani chaired a meeting in which the University staff and elders of the area participated.

On April 22, 2008, Engineer Owais Ahmed Ghani visited University of Malakand Campus I, Chakdara and was briefed about the various sections and departments operating on the campus. He visited computer labs, pharmacy labs and biotechnology labs.

Later on, the Chancellor addressed a joint gathering of faculty and staff members along with students at the Convocation Hall. In his address, he said, “The nation is confronted with enormous challenges and especially the youth must prepare themselves to shoulder enormous responsibilities”. He further added, “We have been facing challenges since our independence and on every occasion, we have emerged stronger as compared to the past”.

Finally, the Chancellor visited the Digital Library, where he was briefed about the functioning of the library and the way the University had been utilizing it for the promotion of research.

1st National Symposium on “Old Plants, New Remedies”

A two- day symposium on “Old Plants, New Remedies” was organized by Department of Pharmacy, University of Malakand on 9th & 10th June 2008.

The symposium was organized with the objective to increase awareness about the importance of Medicinal Plants and Phytomedicine among the researchers and students.

Fifteen resource persons and other distinguished experts participated in the symposium including Prof. Dr. Mansoor Ahmad, Head of Pharmacognosy Department, University of Karachi, Prof. Dr. Tayyeb Ansari, Bahauddin Zakria University, Multan, Prof. Dr. Jehandar Shah, the plant Taxonomist and Ex-Vice Chancellor, University of Malakand, Dr. Noor Muhammad Shah, Deputy Director General Drugs (Health Department) and Chief Pharmacists of all Teaching Hospitals of the N-W.F.P.

The speakers highlighted the abundance of medicinal plants in the northern regions and stressed the researchers to come up with ambitious plans to explore them. They brought to the fore the vitality of such plants and termed them crucial to the country's economy. During the symposium, it was noted that more than 8,000 plants species in South Asia had medicinal values; out of which 2000 medicinal species exist in Pakistan. Stating further, more than 80% of the population of South Asia could afford the primary healthcare cost and they only rely on traditional uses of herbs even in the therapeutic antenatal and postnatal cases. In Pakistan, during 1999, bill on the import of medicinal plants was worth US\$ 31.0 millions whereas the export of medicinal plants could hardly reach US\$ 6.0 millions (EPB, 1999).

1st International Symposium on Biotechnology- Current Trends

The first International Symposium on Biotechnology- Current Trends was organized by the department of Biotechnology, University of Malakand from July 01 to 03, 2008. Renowned scientists attended it from different institutions. Prominent among them included Dr. Haq Nawaz Bhatti, Dr. Anila Durrani, Dr. Masroor Ilahi Babar, Dr. Jasmin Shah, Mr. Khalid Yar Khan, Dr. Syed M. Jamal, Dr. Aqib Iqbal and Dr. Jehandar Shah.

During the symposium, the speakers highlighted the importance of Biotechnology and the challenges ahead.

The guest speakers appreciated the University of Malakand for organizing such event and extended their cooperation to the University for the promotion of the discipline.

Future Plans

The University of Malakand has shouldered the responsibility of educating the generations to come. It has a vision to grow and to enlighten the future generations with the eternal values of education. It took a humble start and since then has grown with a considerable pace. However, at the same time, it is fully aware of the financial and culture constraints. The University is focused to cover the uncovered and in this regard, special attention is paid to strengthening of the faculty and the administration. Similarly, the University intends to establish full-fledged departments of Law, Journalism, Mass Communication, Chemistry, Physics, Geology, Environmental Sciences, Home Economics, Islamic Studies, Library Sciences, Archaeology, Behavioral Sciences, Feministic and Women Studies, Zoology, Urdu, Psychology, International Relations and Bio Informatics. In addition, the strengthening of Sheringal Campus II and the establishment of University of Malakand Campus III at Swat District are at the top of the agenda.
